

## This home, built outside 'Colony' period, still local authentic 'historic' residence

Editor's Note: Atascadero's "Colony Home" period is considered to be 1915 to 1924. E.G. Lewis was forced into involuntary receivership in 1925 and the community was run by Seattle Aattorney Oscar Willett, who formed the Atascadero Development Syndicate (ADS). Headquarters for the ADS were on the mezzanine floor in the original Carlton Hotel. The home owned by Tom and Peggy O'Malley was built in the city's "second" historic period. The Historical Society felt this home would be an excellent one to be included on its annual home tour.

Walking up to the O'Malley house at 6650 Portola Road is like taking a step back to the Roaring

Harry and Minnie Peterson built the house around 1927, in the "Hollywood" style. The Petersons had purchased the property, which was mainly pastureland and orchards, in the early 1920's and lived in a guesthouse until the main house was finished.

Harry Peterson owned the first gentleman's clothing shop in

Atascadero, which was in La Plaza, on Traffic Way and Olmeda Avenue.

The house is slowly being returned to the 1920's era by Tom and Peggy O'Malley, who have owned the property since 1995. Many of the items in the house are from the original home of the Petersons, and some have been purchased from historic places throughout the community.

While the original wrought iron work on the house was created by the same person who did the work over at Hearst Castle, the wrought od. iron balcony that is on the front of the house today came from the Atascadero Inn (which, by the way, was created from the old La Plaza building in which Harry Peterson had his men's furnishings store).

The O'Malleys have other historic memorabilia from the Carlton Hotel coffee shop and other businesses from Atascadero's past. Part of the original artifacts in the home is the piano that is in the front room was owned by Minnie Peterson, according to Tom.

"I have a scar on my eyebrow from falling against this piano as a small boy," he said.

next door to the Petersons in the 1940's and he attended the "Good News Club" at the Peterson home when he was younger. He also did yard work for them when he was in elementary school.

He owns his parent's two and half acres next door still, and has landscaped the total five acres between the two houses into a beautiful garden.

The O'Malleys are continually doing improvements on the house to renovate it to its original time peri-


"We had to remove the 60's look that had been done to it," said Peggy.

The house was owned by the Mulder family for eight years after the Petersons, and then the Adams family lived there for 20 years before the O'Malleys purchased it.

The Petersons at one point had turned the house and outlying buildings into six rental units for military families during WWII.

"They had some difficulties financially after the Great Depression," said Tom. "So they rented out part of the house and the
